## What is Public Art?

- Artwork in the public realm
- Accessible to everyone
- Created from a full range of visual art forms
- Often site-specific
- Can be temporary or permanent
- Often interprets the history of the place, its people, and perhaps addresses a social or environmental issue.
- May be created in collaboration with the community, reflecting the ideas and values of those for whom it's created.

## What is APP?

Founding Legislation Mission Statement Values In 1997, a City Ordinance (Chapter 126, Part 9) was established to designate **.75% percent of art** allocation from original *construction and design costs* of public facilities. The funding is applied to implement the Art in Public Places Program through artwork installation, program administration, long-term maintenance, community outreach and education.





#### **ADMINISTRATION: ARTIST PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT**

#### Panels comprise up to nine members. Members include:

- A Chair- This individual is a member of the APPC
- A site representative This individual is either a staff member or Board member of the site where the art will be installed
- An architect or other design professional
- Two artists, art educators, or art professionals
- One to three community representatives At least one community member must reside in the district where the art will be installed
- A department representative selected by the Chief Administrative Officer from the Office of the Mayor This individual provides subject matter expertise and city process guidance






